
NEW SCHOOL BUILDING RECEIVED AND OCCUPIED

The school board accepted the new school building from Contractor W. L. Morse and it was occupied by the eighth grade and the high school on Monday. Mancos can now boast of one of the best appointed public high school buildings in the state.

Mancos aspires to be the leading school town of the south-west. Her beginning is indeed auspicious. Her public and high schools have a course of study that conforms in every particular to the State Board of Education, and besides embraces a complete course in stenography, typewriting, bookkeeping and penmanship; a course in manual training, and later a course in domestic science will be added. A booklet outlining the entire work has just been is-

sued and a copy may be obtained by anyone interested by applying to the Board of Education.

It is very fitting indeed that a pretty little town like Mancos beautifully situated in a fruitful valley, should aspire to honors as an educational center. It is not without some sacrifice that we are enabled to make this showing, every loyal citizen is proud of it.

The new building is 36×82 ft. 6 in., has five large recitation rooms, two spacious halls, a library room, three rooms for janitor's quarters, has an excellent hot air heating system, and the entire structure is a model of excellence and convenience throughout. It is also wired for electric lighting and equipped with a complete system of electric bells.

With the equipment at hand what boundless opportunity for soul growth and mental development is offered to every boy and girls of this and neighboring communities. What opportunities, unknown to their parents, are offered to the pupils now in school.
